In the summer of 2015, I traveled with 60 singers on a concert tour through Croatia, Montenegro, Albania, Macedonia and Greece. *May the Road Rise Up* was composed for that tour and received its very first performances in the cities we visited, often in collaboration with local choirs.

We knew that the nations of the Balkan region had suffered long under soviet domination and during the decades of political upheaval that followed. The time we traveled was a season of monetary uncertainty for Greece and immediately preceded the Syrian refugee crisis that has led streams of refugees to pass through some of the very cities we visited. Much of what we experienced was difficult to witness. Much of it was transcendently beautiful and proofoundly hopeful. We witnessed over and over again the power of music for healing, to voice sadness, and to lift us in celebration.

Despite the vast cultural differences, we enjoyed standing room audiences in every city. The music brought a palpable and deep emotional connection between the singers and their audiences. We ended each performance by joining hands and singing *May the Road Rise Up*.

May the Road Rise Up was designed to work well with keyboard accompaniment or a cappella because some of our performances took place in orthodox churches where instrumental accompaniment is traditionally not allowed.
